"Who is the most famous artist in this / that genre?" is a question usually open to fervent debate. Nonetheless, it is unarguable to name Yukio Mishima as one of the world's most impactful authors of postwar literature. Because of his untimely death (it is often said that if he hadn't died prematurely at 45, he would have received the Nobel Prize), more than half a century has already passed since Mishima's last published work. It is therefore within our mission to revitalize this significant Japanese author's contributions to the world of the arts.


We are thrilled to open this season fittingly with a Japan Society-commissioned work based on the novel that launched Mishima to international stardom, *Kinkakuji*

(*The Temple of the Golden Pavilion*). This world premiere is followed by a Frenchborn dance/theater production based on Mishima's modern noh play and a work adapted from a lesser-known short story, created in Tokyo. Other offerings include Mishima-related film screenings and discussions of Mishima's legacy, with a set of traditional noh plays that inspired Mishima culminating the series. The spring brings a slate loaded with Japan's best and latest theater, dance and music. Welcome aboard for this exciting season!









YUKIO MISHIMA CENTENNIAL Series EMERGENCES

Five-time Nobel Prize-nominated author, playwright, poet, film director, bodybuilder, Shintoist, ultranationalist and the leader of an attempted coup d'etat that culminated with a gruesome public act of seppuku—the great postwar-era Japanese novelist Yukio Mishima was a deeply complex and divisive figure. Recognizing his immeasurable global influence, Japan Society honors Mishima 100 years after his birth with a series of world and North American premieres inspired by his brilliant and era-defining writings, alongside classic works of noh theater that served as an ancient muse for the artist.

Yukio Mishima's KINKAKUJI

Yukio Mishima's tour de force novel is now adapted as a feverish stage spectacle by a distinctive international creative team consisting of Leon Ingulsrud (SITI Company co-founder), rising young Korean-American actor Major Curda and Berlin-based Chiharu Shiota, one of the most celebrated visual artists of her generation. Mishima's spiraling psychological drama, based on a true, horrifying post-war incident of arson in which an alienated young Buddhist monk burned the 14th-century temple of sacred beauty to the ground, explores the motivations of disaffected youths yearning to "burn it all down." Curda stars as the titular monk under Ingulsrud's direction, while Shiota's starkly beautiful stage design - brought to the U.S. for the first time - offers an unprecedented level of immersion in a Mishima dreamscape.









Chiharu Shiota: Two Home Countries

September 12, 2025 - January 11, 2026



Japan Society Gallery presents the first New York solo museum exhibition of contemporary artist Chiharu Shiota (b. 1972). Commemorating the 80th anniversary of the end of World War II, Chiharu Shiota: Two Home Countries centers on a newly commissioned, site-specific installation that explores wartime speriences and memories. Placing the original installation in dialogue with other works from Shiota's oeuvre, the exhibition creates parallels between the humanitarian tragedy of war and the artist's personal struggles.

Drawing from Yukio Mishima's adaptation of the classic Japanese noh drama Aya no Tsuzumi, distinguished artists Yoshi Oida and Kaori Ito have co-created the spellbinding dance-theater work Le Tambour de Soie (The Silk Drum). Premiering to acclaim at the 2020 Festival d'Avignon in France, this alluring piece begins with an old man sweeping a theater stage played in this U.S. production by New York's Big Dance Theater co-founder Paul Lazar—who falls for a beautiful dancer rehearsing for a show - a role reprised by Ito. Set to a musical tapestry woven by Provence-based musician Makoto Yabuki, this darkly seductive dance strips the original fable down to its core drama between an old man desperate to feel loved again and an indifferent young woman made complicit in his downfall.

The Seven Bridges (Hashi-zukushi)

Adapted from Yukio Mishima's short story

Acclaimed for converting great authors' novels into disarmingly charming yet satirical performances told almost entirely through movement, Tokyo-based **CHAiroiPLIN** (a pun on Charlie Chaplin's name) takes on Yukio Mishima's little-known short story for its North American debut. In *The Seven Bridges*, following a fanciful superstition that crossing seven bridges without conversing with anyone on a full moon night will make their wishes come true, four women set out on a journey under the watchful gaze of the Moon. Obliterating the line between dance and theater, CHAiroiPLIN, founded and led by young choreographer **Takuro Suzuki**, infuses eye-popping color, catchy music, arresting movement and slapstick humor into Mishima's compact reflection on ritual and desire. Which woman will cross the seventh bridge—and, for what kind of wish?

TRADITIONAL NOH THEATER Yukio Mishima immersed himself in Japan's traditional arts and, notably, traditional noh Mishima's Muse – Noh Theater theater, enchanted by its noble elegance and refined beauty. His love for noh resulted in a series of venerated dramatic works, Modern Noh Plays. Now, the distinguished Hosho Noh School, originating in the early 15th century and led by 20th Grand Master Hosho Noh School's American Debut Kazufusa Hosho, brings this elegant art form to the U.S. In accordance with centuriesold tradition, each evening features a rotating offering of the authentic classic repertoire of noh alongside comedic kyogen theater (performed by the prominent Yamamoto Thurs., Dec. 4 at 7:30 pm Tojiro Family). 




In summer 2026 Japan Society Gallery opens the first solo U.S. museum exhibition of Ainu artist Mayunkiki (b. 1982). A groundbreaking multimedia artist, musician, language teacher, and advocate of Ainu culture, Mayunkiki's work explores traditional and contemporary Ainu identity. She calls for a reassessment of how Ainu art and culture is exhibited in museums, challenging the typical presentation of Ainu artifacts by mobilizing indigenous voices and living memory. *Mayunkiki: Reclaim* features the artist's compelling artistic language—both visual and musical—to advocate for a deeper, more nuanced understanding of Ainu art and culture.
